Chair Secretary Postgraduate Liaison Ordinary Member (2 positions)



### Metaphor in End-of-Life Care: an interdisciplinary project

Lancaster University, UK

Funding body: Economic and Social Research Council

For over 18 months now, an interdisciplinary team has been involved in the 'Metaphor in End-of-Life Care' project. The seven-strong interdisciplinary project team includes three RaAM members - Veronika Koller and Elena Semino (Lancaster University) and Zsófia Demjén (Open University) — as well as computer scientists and health researchers. Together, we have used a combination of 'manual' and corpus-based methods to investigate the metaphors used to talk about end-of-life care in a 1.5-million-word corpus consisting of interviews with and online forum posts by terminally ill patients, family carers and health professionals.

#### Aims

Our aims are to see how members of these different stakeholder groups use metaphor to talk about their experiences, attitudes and expectations of end-of-life care (e.g. terminal illness, palliative treatment, preparations for dying) and what the use of metaphor by these stakeholder groups suggests about their experiences and needs, and about their mutual relationships.

#### **Focus**

- Different 'Violence' and 'Journey' metaphors used by the different groups and the function of those metaphors within the discourse of end-of-life care
- Metaphor scenarios in connection with carer emotions
- ▶ Metaphors and narratives in hospice managers' accounts of 'good' and 'bad' deaths

### **Events**

With the funded phase of the project ending in June 2014, we have had a string of dissemination events since the beginning of the year:

'Using Corpus Methods to Analyze Metaphor in Discourse' (workshop)

'Metaphor in Health Communication' (symposium sponsored by RaAM)

<u>'Language in End-of-Life Care'</u> (user event held in central London where we shared our main findings with an audience of healthcare professionals and researchers specialising in palliative and end-of-life care)

### **VisMet Baby**

### Pilot Phase of the Corpus of Visual Metaphors

Dr. Marianna Bolognesi, Metaphor Geeks, and Prof. Gerard Steen, Metaphor Lab

This June will see the launching of VisMet Baby, the pilot for an envisioned corpus hosted by the Metaphor Lab (Faculty of Arts, VU University Amsterdam) and developed in collaboration with the Network Institute (VU University Amsterdam) and Metaphor Geeks (International Center for Intercultural Exchange). The aim of the VisMet project is to create an online resource of annotated images that can be used by students and researchers from different academic fields interested in visual rhetoric, and in particular in understanding, analysing, and comparing visual metaphors and their configuration with other visual tropes, across a variety of images and genres. The initial version of around 360 images will gradually be expanded with new materials as well as with new functionalities, such as an open forum and an online tool for crowdsourcing tags for the collected images. By adding such functionalities, coordinator Marianna Bolognesi and scientist in charge Gerard Steen, together with research assistants Romy van den Heerik and Esther van den Berg, aim to create a platform where the most recent debates, insights, and analyses around visual and multimodal metaphors can be shared in order to achieve an advance in common knowledge in the field of visual metaphor studies. In February 2014, Amber Boeynaems started her PhD project 'Dynamics of Figurative Framing in Public Discourse' at the Department of Communication Science, VU University Amsterdam (Netherlands). Through experimental research, Amber investigates the effects of figurative language types (metaphor, hyperbole, irony) on issue perceptions. The project also focuses on the dynamics underlying these effects.

# **Doctorate degrees**

Dr. Anna Kalve (Riga)

Supervisor: Prof., Dr. philol. Anita Načisčione

The phenomenon of conceptual metaphor

Dr. Kalve explores conceptual metaphor as a central notion in cognitive linguistics. She collected a wide range of empirical data in Latvian and identified and explored original Latvian concepts and conceptual metaphors that reflect typical features of the Latvian language, mindset and culture, e. g., GOODNESS IS THE SUN, CRISIS IS A MIRE, FREEDOM IS LIGHT, CAPTIVITY IS DARKNESS.

They are reflected in innumerable linguistic metaphors that have been created in the Latvian language and thought as a result of historical, cognitive and spiritual experience. They have been retained in the nation's long-term collective memory.

Kalve argues that these conceptual metaphors have acquired diachronic stability. The explored figurative material discloses the wealth of Latvian figurative thought that is vividly represented not only in folk songs and Latvian literary heritage but also in today's language use.

How far can you stretch a note? Developing an approach to the study of metaphor in the language of music instruction

While it is known that metaphor is used extensively in education across disciplines, little research to date has examined how metaphor is applied in music instruction at advanced levels. Here, metaphors explain expressive performance features that a player uses to make one interpretation more meaningful than another. This study therefore explores metaphor through the lens of the language music teachers use, developing an investigative approach which enables new insights into the nature and function of metaphorical language in this context.

From the study, it is clear that metaphor is highly conventionalised in teacher talk during advanced music instruction. There are hitherto undetected structures and patterns in the use of metaphor in its linguistic expression, as well as in potential underlying concepts. On the surface, there is an apparent diversity in the way teachers describe musical sound, while on a deeper level, a striking systematicity is evident.

Three outcomes emerge from the study: It contributes to the growing body of research on metaphor in educational discourse and on collections of naturally occurring language; it provides a lexicon of metaphor usage, with practical applications in music pedagogy particularly for speakers of other languages; and it provides greater insight into the use of metaphor in communicating how music is perceived, performed, and taught, in particular in relation to expressive performance—one of the most elusive aspects of the art.

My home is in Brisbane (or Brisvegas, as it is affectionately known), on the east coast of Australia. Australian English is my language. It's sometimes not intelligible to other English speakers. I have undergraduate and postgraduate degrees in music as well as postgraduate degrees in applied linguistics and editing. ### **Chiara Pollaroli**

I am a PhD student at the Faculty of Communication Sciences at the University of Lugano (Switzerland) and I am currently a visiting PhD student at the University of Amsterdam with a scholarship from the Swiss National Science Foundation. My PhD research project aims to combine argumentation and pictorial/multimodal metaphors and metonymies.

The title of my project is "T(r)opical patterns in advertising: the argumentative relevance of pictorial and multimodal metaphors and metonymies".

### **Project summary**

My PhD research aims at contributing to the field of argumentation theory by investigating whether and how pictorial and multimodal metaphors and metonymies fulfill an argumentative relevant function in advertising. I start from the assumptions that advertising (1) is a communicative activity that advances reasons in support of a claim (e.g., 'You should buy product X'), (2) employs metaphors and metonymies both in their monomodal (pictorial or verbal) and multimodal manifestations, (3) exploit the combination of verbal and pictorial elements to advance reasons in support of a claim. Studies on the relationship between rhetorical tropes and argumentation have tried to show not only that tropes synthesize arguments, but also that they have a strong argumentative force in comparison to other forms of communication. However, research needs to be conducted on the isomorphism between tropes and the inferential structures of reasoning called loci or topoi. I hypothesize that metaphors synthesize arguments from analogy and metonymies synthesize causal argumentation (material cause, instrumental cause, final cause, etc.). This goal is achieved analyzing a corpus of 60 print advertisements and billboards. The method of analysis includes (1) Blending Theory that enables to make explicit the relevant properties projected to the incongruous blend and the shared abstract category that input spaces belong to; (2) Pragma-Dialectics, one of the leading theories in argumentation studies that enables to reconstruct the claim(s) and the reason(s) advanced to support a claim in everyday argumentative discourses; (3) the Argumentum Model of Topics (AMT) which enables to make explicit the inferential processes that link reasons to claims. The AMT is particularly suited to unveil the inferential structure of reasoning (locus or topos) that is at the basis of pictorial/multimodal tropes in advertising.
