The Development of Metaphoric Competence in French and Japanese Learners of English

Sarah Turner used written examination scripts produced by French and Japanese learners of English to explore how metaphor use developed as the learners made progress, both in terms of its range and sophistication, and in terms of the discourse functions learners used it to perform. She also investigated the relationship between metaphor use and other areas of language competence, particularly lexis and phraseology, before drawing together these areas to explore what 'metaphoric competence' might mean in the context of learners' exam-based written language, and how it might be measured.

Sarah now lives in Tokyo, where her role as Project Assistant Professor at the University of Tokyo involves helping to develop and deliver an academic English programme for new undergraduate students.

According to Conceptual Metaphor Theory (CMT, Lakoff & Johnson 1980), metaphors are matters of thought, and as such they are independent from the modality of expression. But while linguistic manifestations have been widely and extensively investigated, other modalities still lack comprehensive empirical evidence that has been consistently analyzed to support (or challenge) this theory.

The development of Cogvim entails the construction of a model for visual metaphor's cognitive grounding, based on an innovative network-approach that will highlight and compare the overlapping features between concepts involved in visual metaphors in contrast to those that characterize verbal metaphors. This objective will be achieved through extensive semi-automated analyses of the concepts involved in metaphors, conducted across three large-scale electronic databases of semantic information:

- a set of semantic features collected from participants' descriptions of concrete, basic-level concepts;
- (ii) a set of annotated images, formalized by metadata from Flickr;
- (iii) a semantically annotated corpus of texts.

The Value of Deliberate Metaphor

Gudrun Reijnierse is doing her PhD on Deliberate Metaphor, under the supervision of professor Gerard Steen. For her thesis, she investigates the difference between deliberate and non-deliberate metaphors. She first establishes a theoretical framework for deliberate metaphor and will develop a method for its identification. It will subsequently examine the functions and distribution of deliberate metaphor in spoken and written English discourse. Experimental research will investigate how deliberate metaphors are recognized and processed by language users. Currently, Gudrun is at the University of Lancaster for a three month stay to work on her project with professor Elena Semino.

Metaphor in American editorial cartoons about the presidential elections of 1936 and 2012

Research Master Thesis in Media Studies

Lucas Reehorst recently completed a research master's thesis in media studies on the subject of pictorial and multimodal metaphors in American editorial cartoons about the presidential elections of 1936 and 2012. In the thesis a corpus of 480 cartoons in which metaphors are used to convey something about the target domain presidential elections are analyzed (the corpus can be accessed online here). The source domains used in cartoons about the 1936 elections are compared to those presented in cartoons printed in 2012 and to the source domains discussed in 9 previous studies of primarily verbal election metaphors (Howe 1988, Blankenship and Kang 1991, Abadi and Sacerdoti 2001, Wei 2000, 2003, Scheithauer 2007, Burnes 2011 and Berberović 2013, Conners 2005). The thesis identifies the frequencies with which different source domains were used in the two corpora. In addition the sets of mappings/correspondences involved in the metaphors presented in the cartoons were identified, showing that metaphors that involve the same source-target pairing often involve wildly divergent sets of correspondences (e.g. some commerce metaphors cast politicians as rival salesmen and voters as consumers, while in other metaphors the politicians correspond to buyers, while votes correspond to goods and voters to sellers). The thesis also traces shifts in the meaning of metaphors that involve the same source and target that have taken place over time. Also addressed are the presence of different types of motivated metaphors, including comparisons to phenomena that are highly topical at the moment the metaphor is presented, topic-triggered metaphors which involve a source domain that is linked to the metaphor's target (e.g. a depiction of a speech on a golf course in terms of the source domain golf) and pictorially and linguistically motivated metaphors (e.g. metaphors prompted by a pun, nomen-est-omen metaphors). Julius Caesar, Juliasi Kaizari or Juliuse Kesara? - Proper names and titles in African and European translations of Shakespeare's plays. A comparison.

Cornelia will present a poster on the topic of proper name allusions in African and European translation at the RaAM seminar in Leiden!

Focusing on translations of *Julius Caesar* and *Macbeth* into several African and European languages, I analysed the strategies which the different translators used to transfer a) proper names of persons, b) proper names of places, c) proper name allusions (e.g. to Greek/Roman mythology or history) and d) titles.

The strategies employed by African and European translators differed mainly in the category of proper name allusions. Allusive names require a certain knowledge on the reader's side to be understood correctly since they refer to (real and fictitious) persons, places, events, history, other literary works etc. and contain connotations. Due to the linguistic, geographic and especially the cultural distance between Shakespeare and African audiences, African translators tend to add information or to make the allusion explicit by replacing names by common nouns or descriptions.

Why have we created the RaAM Student Directory?

At present, although we have the Facebook group, we are not very well connected as RaAM student members and lack a central database for browsing others' topics, activities and research interests. For this reason, we are creating the RaAM Student Directory, which will appear in the new student section of the site.

What will the RaAM Student Directory be like and why should I join?

The RaAM Student Directory is designed to help you become more visible as an up-and-coming researcher and is much like a university's department staff/student directory (i.e. it contains basic research and contact details and is publicly searchable). Being listed in the RaAM Student Directory is a great way for helping you get your research, activities, awards etc. seen by others in the field and showcase your membership of RaAM (handy for your CV!). You can also benefit from using the directory as a resource for archiving (and publicising) information about your research, activities, awards, conferences attended etc. and for finding others with whom you might exchange ideas, tips and (one day) collaborate!

How can I join the RaAM Student Directory?

You can join at any point in time but you must be a student member of RaAM to be eligible. To join, simply email the following information to postgrad_liaison@raam.org.uk:

- Your full name
- The title of your research (i.e. your PhD/MA by Research project title)
- Your programme of study (e.g. PhD in Education)
- Your University
- Your research interests (2 to 3 sentences max. you may want to state future aspirations here)
- Activities (awards, other memberships, projects, conferences attended, skills etc.)
- Your contact email address
- Your picture (optional)
- Links to your university page or a personal website, blog etc.

We will of course be happy to update (or remove) your information at your request.
